## *Faith in Adolescents*

Like most of you, I imagine, I am an ordinary parishioner who continues to attend Mass and other special events at St. Ignatius Loyola because the community and the services are so nourishing. I have felt God present to me in many places in my life, but I do so in a special way at St. Ignatius, which is why I keep coming back. My faith life has seen many different landscapes, not all of them particularly smooth, which is why I am so grateful for, and amazed by the constancy of my experience here at the Parish.

When Fr. Blaszczak advertised for a part-time High School Ministry position a few months ago, I was excited by the Parish's decision to commit to this age group, and I was drawn to the idea of working in a Parish I have grown to love, with a staff of people who have been instrumental figures in my own faith journey, however unaware most of them were to this fact. At the time, I was in the midst of discernment about my own work and faith, and it would be a few months before I could formally apply, meet the Parish staff and some involved parishioners, and together agree that I should join this community in this new role. I am deeply grateful for this opportunity. This new role is part of a larger next chapter for me, which will also include full-time graduate work at the Yale Divinity School in September. This will allow me to invest more deeply in many of the things I hold most dear: my work with adolescents, my Jesuit spirituality, and my love of learning.

Although my official start is late summer, we thought it would be good to do the introductions before the summer really began. You may wonder what has prepared me for this role and what I may have in mind for the program, and I'll do my best to speak to both of those questions. Just a week ago, I said goodbye to the students and faculty

at Regis High School, where I have been Director of Campus Ministry since 2002. During these incredibly rich years, I directed many student retreats, trained the retreat leaders and Eucharistic ministers, planned the liturgies, coached soccer, and taught freshman Church History and numerous senior seminars in the Theology and English departments, on subjects as diverse as Zen Buddhism, Vocation, the Laity in the Church, T. S. Eliot, and Indian Literature. A few summers ago I was awarded a Fulbright fellowship to study Islamic culture in Malaysia with ten other American teachers, and last summer I worked and traveled in East Africa, developing a partnership between

Regis and St. Aloysius Gonzaga, a high school for AIDS orphans in Nairobi, Kenya. I've combined all of this work with a healthy amount of playtime as well -- trips abroad, a bike safari, time with my close friends in Manhattan, and long visits with my young nieces and nephew in upstate NY and Richmond, Virginia. I have a bit of a restless spirit, and a seemingly unquenchable thirst for new experiences.

In my mind, this open engagement with the world is one of the many gifts I have received from the adolescents I have worked with over the years. Contrary to some of the sociological data on teenagers and the Church, I have found that they have a higher than average curiosity about religion and faith, but less confidence in most of

the typical answers. As most adults remember from their own days as teenagers, adolescence is a privileged time for discovering things on your own, a time when peers and parents can be competing authorities, and a time when experience is often a greater teacher than verbal instruction. There is obvious risk in this approach to life, but there is also great opportunity, and I hope to cultivate the great opportunity here (while also suggesting ways of minimizing the risks). I have found that adolescents appreciate a faith that manifests itself in distinct action, a faith community that welcomes them and wants their contribution, and that allows them to develop friendships in the spirit of something larger than themselves. In my experience, St. Ignatius already does all of that for the adults, and is in a great position to do so equally well with the teenagers. It is my sense that not only do some of our teenagers need a spiritual home of their own, but the Parish needs the teenagers. They will strengthen the community, and they will deepen our faith. The Spirit is very much at work here, and I see myself as a mere collaborator in that work. Here are a few of the things I plan on doing:

As the school year begins in the Fall, I will be introducing myself to the Ignatian Teens group, who have been doing service monthly under the direction of Judy Choix, and see if there are ways we can make this component of their lives even stronger. I will also be contacting the recent graduates of our Grammar School and IREP Program to see who may be interested in gathering again and being involved in this initiative. I'll be working with the Parish web developer to create an on-line presence that will work to keep interested parties informed and involved. I'll be depending on some of the high school students I already know to help me begin a retreat program for the teenagers. I will also be asking members of the Ignatian Young Adults if they would like to be involved in this work, perhaps as mentors or co-presenters. But most importantly, I'll be meeting the high school-age parishioners and their friends, listening to their questions and ideas, and working with them to establish a program that brings together teenagers and the Church, revealing to them both their mutual need for each other.

Lest I leave you with the impression that this initiative is a solo adventure, I will not be able to do much without your support. Many of you know a high school student or two and can suggest they get involved in some of the events we'll be planning together. Young people usually need an adult in their life who leads them into things, and they will look to you for encouragement. I am also, by na-

ture, a collaborative worker and I like having other (semi-) young adults around. Opportunities will come for you to be a part of this program, and I hope you'll take them. The program will be better because of your involvement, and I will need you.

I do believe that St. Ignatius is a spiritual gift to the city, and I hope you will join me in opening our doors anew to those who need the constancy and love so many find here, and whose questions and curiosities are the very thing our Church and Parish need in return. Thank you for being a part of this great moment.

### ISN Mid-Atlantic Justice Conference

The Ignatian Solidarity Network is holding a Mid-Atlantic Justice Conference at St. Joseph's University in Philadelphia on Friday, July 13 – Sunday, July 15. 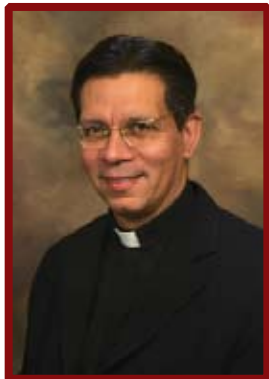

## *Look for a New Face at St. Ignatius this summer!*



**F**ather Ralph J. Rivera, SJ, a Jesuit of the New York Province, was ordained to the priesthood on Saturday, June 9, 2007, at the Alumni Memorial Chapel of Loyola College in Baltimore, Maryland, by Cardinal William H. Keeler, Archbishop of Baltimore.

Fr. Rivera was born on March 26, 1954, in New York, NY, and was raised by his paternal grandparents, Leonor and Emilio. After graduating from Columbia University in New York in 1981, he worked as an assistant editor for the union newspaper of District 65/UAW. From 1985 to 1991, he worked as a union organizer in Puerto Rico for the same union. From 1991 to 1993, he served as Director of the Puerto Rican Civil Rights Institute in San Juan. From 1993 to 1996, he worked as associate director of the National Labor Committee for Worker and Human Rights in Central America in New York. This work aimed to protect women and child laborers exploited by contractors working for large U.S. apparel companies. Before entering the Jesuits, he was development director and educator for the Hunger Action Network of New York State.

**F**r. Rivera entered the Society of Jesus in 1998, in Syracuse, NY, and pronounced his first vows of poverty, chastity and obedience in August 2000. He studied philosophy and theology at Loyola University Chicago, earning a graduate degree in philosophy. While in Chicago, Fr. Rivera worked as a chaplain at the Cook County Jail. For his regency he worked as an adjunct professor of philosophy at St. Peter's College in Jersey City and as a pastoral assistant at St. Mary of the Assumption Parish in Staten Island, NY.

Fr. Rivera resumed his theology studies in 2004 and is completing a master's degree in divinity at the Jesuit School of Theology in Berkeley, CA. Ordained as a deacon in October 2006, Fr. Rivera has served as a deacon at St. Leo the Great Church in Oakland, CA, where he also assists in a weekly workshop for Catholics returning to the Church. He also served as a caregiver for the Zen Hospice Project in San Francisco.

Fr. Rivera's first Mass at St. Ignatius will be celebrated on Saturday, July 7, at 5:30PM. We warmly welcome Fr. Rivera to our Parish.

## *Following a Jesuit's Journey ...*

**K**urt Denk served on the Parish Staff at St. Ignatius Loyola in January 2006 and on Saturday, June 9th, he was ordained at Alumni Memorial Chapel at Loyola College in Baltimore, MD. Cardinal Keeler, the Archbishop of Baltimore, presided at the Ordination Mass. Father Kurt then celebrated his first Mass of Thanksgiving on Sunday, June 10th (also at Loyola College) with both Fathers Blaszczyk and Witt concelebrating. Father Kurt has been a frequent visitor at St. Ignatius over the past few years and recently led a series of spiritual retreats for young adults at our Parish.

Father Kurt's ordination was a special event for me for two reasons. First, he was my roommate at Georgetown University for three years and remains one of my closest friends. For the past eleven years, I have watched Kurt progress through his formation as a Jesuit priest. It's a truly remarkable process: after two years of study as a Jesuit novice in Syracuse, Kurt received a master's degree in philosophy from Fordham University in 2001, taught philosophy at Loyola College in Baltimore for three years, and then received a master's degree in theology at the University of California at Berkeley earlier this year. Along the way, he taught history at Fordham Prep, served as a chaplain at St. Barnabas Hospital in the Bronx and at San Quentin state prison in San Francisco, was the director of the Jesuit Family Retreat Program, and coordinated Jesuit programs in Mexico and China. And that's only a partial list of his activities these past eleven years.

Kurt's ordination was also special to me because I just completed the RCIA program at St. Ignatius and was confirmed at the Easter Vigil two months ago. Born and raised a Lutheran, I chose to become Catholic after attending Mass with my wife at St. Ignatius for the past couple of years (a decision that Kurt certainly encouraged!) It was a wonderful experience for me to receive Communion from my college roommate at his first Mass of Thanksgiving just weeks after becoming a Catholic myself.

Father Kurt will be spending the next three years studying for his law degree at the University of California at Berkeley – and hopefully he'll continue to be a frequent visitor at St. Ignatius when he's back in the New York City area. If you happen to see him around the Parish during one of his visits, please be sure to congratulate him and wish him good luck on the next chapter of his life as a Jesuit priest.
