Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

An Anniversary Remembered

In late January, fifty years ago, Pope John XXIII announced to the church and to the world that he intended to convoke an ecumenical council, the 21st ecumenical council in the history of the church. John XXIII had been Pope for a little less than three months. His announcement electrified the Christian world. It had been nearly a century since the previous ecumenical council, a century of great social, technological and scientific development. The Pope determined the goal of the council was to provide a new openness on the part of the church toward the world and to promote the peace and unity of all humankind.

In October of 1962, after nearly four years of preparation, about twenty six hundred bishops from all over the world gathered in St. Peter's Basilica in the Vatican to begin the council. That council concluded three years later, under an open sky, in St. Peter's Square. That this took place in such a setting was itself a dramatic statement by the church of a new self-understanding. The church was reaching out to the world - rather like the Bernini colonnade which embraces the square - wanting to receive from the world as well as to give.

We are a different church today from what we were when the council concluded in 1965. If you are less than fifty-five years of age, you may have little or no first-hand memory of what the church was like at that time. For those of us over the age of fifty-five, the most visible change is the way the sacraments, particularly the Eucharist, are celebrated. The Mass is now celebrated in the vernacular, facing the congregation, and with the active participation of the worshipers.

The deepest change in the church as a result of the council has been the emerging role of the laity.

Before the council, the role of the laity was to be helpers to the hierarchy and the clergy. For too many Catholics, however, the hierarchy and clergy were the church. That misperception was rejected by the council, which clearly taught that laypersons are as much a part of the church as the Pope, bishops, clergy and religious. The laity participate directly in the church's mission to teach, to worship, and to transform the world. They participate by reason of their baptism, and not because they were delegated to do so by a bishop or pastor.

What this has meant over the past forty years is that more and more lay men and lay women hold responsible positions in the institution of the church - in diocesan chancery offices and in parishes around the country. For evidence of this, please check the two right hand columns on the last page of this bulletin! Not listed are the many *other* laypersons who are heavily involved in the life and ministries of our parish. All this would have been unthinkable before the council.

The prominence being given to the laity in the mission of the church is not just a temporary phenomenon. It is not as though the church is waiting for a dramatic increase in vocations to the priesthood and religious life, and then some clerical take-back of the ministries now entrusted to the laity. No, the laity have their rightful place in the mission of the church, in conjunction with clergy and those in religious life. Quite simply, because this is their vocation from God. And for the first time in a very long time we are recognizing that, and celebrating.

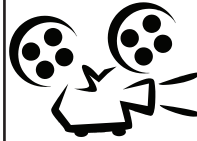
