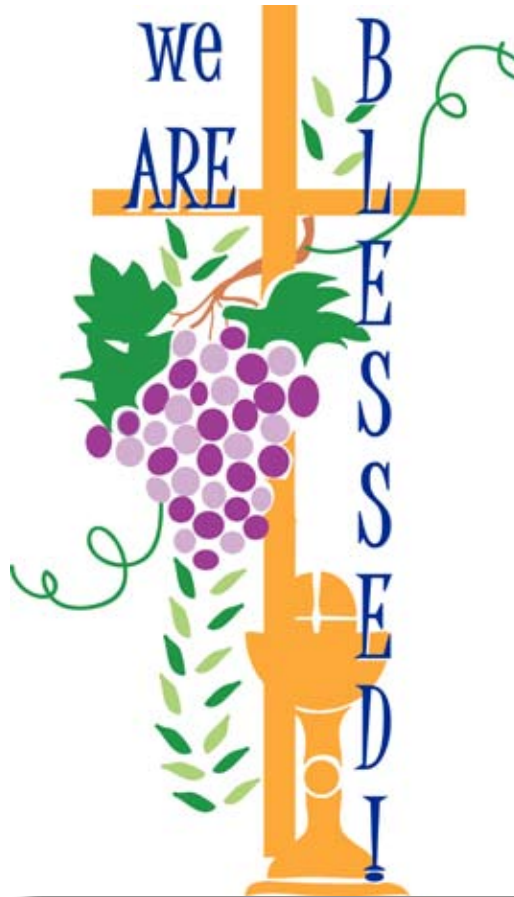
WE ARE BLESSED!

Today is “Commissioning Sunday.” At every Mass this weekend the presider will call all active lay ministers to step forward and join him at the altar. He will thank them for their service, bless them, and commission them to go forth in Christ’s love to serve our community. Each will receive a small gold tone cross to wear on his or her lapel as a sign of commitment to, and love for, Jesus Christ. More than 200 devoted parishioners will step up to be blessed - more than 200!

What an awesome thought! So many busy New Yorkers finding time to serve one another and God. At St Ignatius Loyola we are truly blessed. We have a wonderful professional staff who work diligently to keep our church running smoothly. They keep the physical space clean, polished and in grand working order - no small task considering the number of people who pass through our doors each week. They organize the rooms needed for all our activities, keep the calendar straight, send out email blasts, put together a beautiful bulletin each week, and keep an inspired web site up and running. They also keep our spiritual lives healthy and polished, with lectures and programs, retreats and support groups. And last, but certainly not least, our priests continue to challenge us to stretch our spiritual selves with inspiring homilies. Yes, I’d call us blessed!

As if this isn’t enough, we are greatly blessed by the lay ministers who give so much of themselves! Many of us, like you and me, hold down a wide variety of responsibilities. There never seem to be enough hours in the day to juggle jobs, schools and families. It is exhausting to think of the number of additional hours donated

to our Parish by lay ministers. As the number of priests and women religious declines, the role of the lay minister becomes increasingly more important. The lay ministers will be taking on more and more of the responsibility of keeping Church communities alive and vibrant. It is what we are called to do. We are the Church.



I recently had dinner with a group of friends, most of whom are very involved at the Parish. I asked them what it was about their ministry that moves them? What it was that keeps them going? One friend, a woman much wiser than I, said it simply and beautifully: she said it is all about Christ and bringing Christ to others. People who have lost a loved one know Christ walked with them as they journeyed with a dying spouse or partner, and they still feel Christ walking with them now as they rebuild their lives as single adults. Another friend said it was the feeling of a strong community of faith which keeps her going. Many of us are alone in this city, our families may be far away. We have built a new family here at St. Ignatius Loyola, a family of like-minded people, with a common goal.

For myself, I’d have to say that before I became active in Parish lay ministry, I was very involved with my career, keeping myself busy with friends and clients. It was typical for me to go to the newest, best restaurant for dinner, with no thought of its cost. I can tell you honestly: it was an empty feeling, without substance or depth. Once I started to learn more about poverty, local and global, my eyes were opened; I got it! I heard the call to serve and I gladly answered. I felt complete,

satisfied and at ease. I'm not saying I never go out for a fabulous meal, but I now have balance. My soul is nourished by the work I do at St. Ignatius. My heart is full. This is definitely a two way street: I give of myself to this Church, and I am rewarded in ways previously unimaginable to me.

We all feel the presence of Christ in what we do. If we are distributing communion to others during a Liturgy, or bringing communion to a home-bound parishioner, surely Christ is there with us, shining through our eyes. Christ is with us also as we serve guests at the soup kitchen, make beds for our shelter guests, or just sit and chat with an elderly person at The Lott House, or at Goldwater Hospital.



It's safe to say that Christ is present during any activity which we perform in His name, and all we do as lay ministers in His name.

I am in no way a "super Catholic" or a perfect Catholic. I believe myself to be an ordinary, broken woman, doing my best to serve the Lord I love, Jesus Christ. If you receive the host or the cup from me, know that I am offering it to you on behalf of Christ.

Ibelieve Jesus Christ has called each of us by name to serve. We have been asked to share our unique God-given talents with our community, our Community of Disciples. We are, after all, "Co-Workers in the Vineyard"

As the Chair of the Parish Ministry Council, I'd like to say thank you to every lay minister at St. Ignatius. Thank you for all of the love and energy you bring to our Church. The Church of St. Ignatius Loyola wouldn't be the remarkable place it is without each of you. And to those who haven't gotten involved yet, I ask you to look at what we offer, see where you might "fit" and give it a try. We pride ourselves on being friendly and welcoming here. We want you to join us. We want you to feel completely at home.

We are living in troubled times. We are facing struggles of many kinds on personal, interpersonal and societal levels, such as: illness, losses of loved ones or of jobs, unchecked market forces causing great uncertainty about the future, fragmented relationships within families and among nations, and an impending crisis in the environment. We are challenged to gather our fragmented selves, to find meaning in our experience of Christ in the midst of life and the world as it is. This weekend offers an opportunity for anyone - single, or married couples - to regain balance in stressful times. Message from the U.S. Bishops

The Virtue of Prudence

The Church also encourages Catholics to develop the virtue of prudence, which enables us "to discern our true good in every circumstance and to choose the right means of achieving it" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 1806). Prudence shapes and informs our ability to deliberate over available alternatives, to determine what is most fitting to a specific context, and to act. Prudence must be accompanied by courage which calls us to act. As Catholics seek to advance the common good, we must carefully discern which public policies are morally sound. A good end does not justify an immoral means. At times Catholics may choose different ways to respond to social problems, but we cannot differ on our obligation to protect human life and dignity and help build through moral means a more just and peaceful world.

ETHIOPIA is a landlocked country situated in the Horn of Africa. Ethiopia is bordered by Eritrea to the north, Sudan to the west, Kenya to the south, Somalia to the east and Djibouti to the northeast. Ethiopia is one of the oldest countries in the world, and Africa's second-most populous nation.

Ethiopia has yielded some of humanity's oldest traces, making the area important in the history of humanity. Recent studies claim that the vicinity of present-day Addis Ababa was the point from which human beings migrated around the world.

WHEN WE GATHER. . . In Kiswahili, **NYUMBANI** literally means 'In the house.' **NYUMBANI** is an encompassing word for many aspects of African life, both symbolic and literal: home and family; one's land and country; language, customs, food, dress, life habits, politics. **NYUMBANI** is when people meet - from different areas, communities, ethnic-language groups, and countries. **NYUMBANI** provides a sense of security, mutual help, respect and recognition of the person belonging to the community.

In New York, **NYUMBANI** is a community of ideas and conversation on Africa. The hope is to emphasize the people and not the circumstances and to be a community of study, discussion and action based on fellowship. We invite those who share our common humanity - Christians, Hindus, Jews, Muslims, and people of all faiths (or none), who believe in the dignity of the human person. Please join us as dreamers, builders of villages, and as changers for shared humanity.

Please join your Africa-interested colleagues and parishioners as humanitarians to become a **NYUMBANI** community for the evening, and to consider building bridges with people and a society on the other side of the world – the people of **ETHIOPIA**.

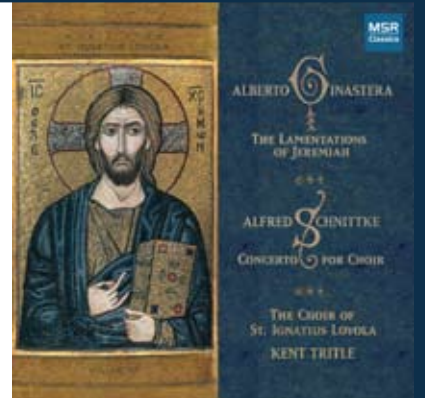
