The Ignatian Way: Prayer, Service, Community

January 15, 2017

Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

Peter-Hans Kolvenbach, S.J. (1928–2016)

Fr. Peter-Hans Kolvenbach, S.J., 29th Superior General of the Society of Jesus, passed away on November 26, 2016, in Beirut, Lebanon. He was 87 years old and 68 years a Jesuit. He served as Superior General for nearly a quarter-century, from 1983 until his resignation in 2008. A Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated in Beirut on November 30th, which would have been his 88th birthday. Fr. Arturo Sosa, S.J., recently elected as the 31st Superior General, gave the homily. Fr. Kolvenbach is the only Superior General to die and be buried outside of Rome.

According to the norms of the Society of Jesus, at the death of one who was Superior General, a Mass is to be offered by every Jesuit; in addition, “in our churches a suitable liturgical celebration is to be held with the participation of externs.”

Our parish will commemorate Father Kolvenbach’s life and pray for his eternal rest on Sunday, January 22, at the 11 AM Solemn Mass. This date was chosen because it falls within the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. Fr. Kolvenbach was the only Superior General of the Jesuits to be ordained in one of the Eastern Rites of the Catholic Church, the Armenian rite.

The Unity of Christians was at the center of Fr. Kolvenbach’s missionary heart. Born in 1928 in Druten, Netherlands, of a German father and an Italian mother, he entered the Society in 1948, studied in Nijmegen and Paris, and was sent to Lebanon for advanced studies in linguistics, especially the Armenian language and literature. He spent a year of his Jesuit formation in Pomfret, Connecticut, and returned to the Near East where he led the Jesuits of Lebanon, Syria, and Egypt, Jordan, Turkey, and the Holy Land. He was at ease in many languages, many cultures, many Christian traditions. His gentle style and peaceable nature were forged in the turmoil of World War II, and served him well in the war-torn countries of the Near and Middle East. His energy and holiness were directed to reconciliation among peoples, in particular Christians of east and west.

This year’s theme for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity (January 18–25) is “Reconciliation: The Love of Christ Compels Us.” The biblical text is 2 Corinthians 5:14: *For the love of Christ urges us on, because we are convinced that one has died for all; therefore all have*

died. And he died for all, so that those who live might live no longer for themselves, but for him who died and was raised for them.

The theme finds its origins in Pope Francis’ 2013 Apostolic Exhortation *Evangelii Gaudium* (“The Joy of the Gospel”). It should be noted that this biblical text emphasizes that reconciliation is a gift from God, intended for the entire creation. “Goodness always tends to spread. Every authentic experience of truth and goodness seeks by its very nature to grow within us, and any person who has experienced a profound liberation becomes more sensitive to the needs of others.... If we wish to lead a dignified and fulfilling life, we have to reach out to others and seek their good” (EG 9). Christ has committed to us the message of reconciliation. As a result of God’s action, those who have been reconciled in Christ are called in turn to proclaim this reconciliation in word and deed. *The love of Christ compels us.*

In a telegram of condolence sent to Fr. Sosa, Pope Francis recalled Fr. Kolvenbach’s “integral fidelity to Christ and his Gospel, together with a generous commitment in exercising his office in a spirit of service for the good of the Church.”

Integrity, generosity, spirit of service—these were the hallmarks of a priest who had reconciliation among Christians, and inter-religious dialogue, in his DNA. In an interview given in 2007 to Fr. Jim McDermott, S.J., Fr. Kolvenbach recalls his arrival in the Levant:

When in October 1958 we arrived by boat in the harbor of Beirut, Lebanon, fighting was going on. The 18 different religious groups were trying to dominate one another, making political and military alliances with the help of neighboring countries. Still, Lebanon wanted to maintain a message that diverse people can live, work and practice their beliefs with one another. The welcome of the Lebanese was unforgettable. Even as the division in the country grew worse, never was the hope abandoned that Lebanon might become a sign of communal harmony for the whole Near East.

As we begin this year’s Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, our prayers of suffrage will include Fr. Kolvenbach and our prayers of petition will echo the final prayer of Jesus, “that they may be one.”

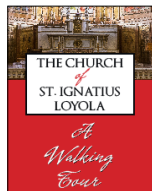

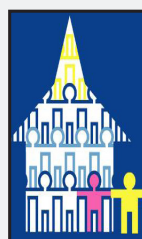
